

At Aldingbourne Primary School we want to make sure children are happy. Children are happy when they are learning `how to' do things. At Aldingbourne Primary School we like to work alongside parents to encourage children to develop as fully as possible. We want to help our children to:


grow socially grow personally grow academically

We particularly wish to encourage good behaviour. We believe that good behaviour needs to be carefully developed. It is too important to be left to chance. We think young children learn best when they are clear about what they are supposed to do and when they are continually and consistently encouraged to do it. This booklet is about how we aim to do this. Children, teachers and parents have worked together to produce this booklet. It sets out:

- how we encourage good behaviour in our school
- how we discourage inappropriate behaviour





At Aldingbourne Primary School it is our aim to prevent any form of bullying from occurring. Bullying behaviour includes: name calling and teasing both face to face and online, physical violence and threats.

We define bullying as ...

"When someone continually behaves nastily to others making them feel unhappy and distressed."

HOW WE DEAL WITH BULLYING

In order to deal with any cases of bullying we believe that it is important to promote school values which reject bullying behaviour and promote cooperative behaviour.

It is often possible to deal with a minor situation by discussing the problem with the children and helping then find a solution to the problem. However when bullying is clearly proven further action will be necessary as set out above and will always involve parents. Parents with any concerns should contact their child's class teacher or Headteacher to discuss the matter further.

We have our Golden Rules which remind the children of these expectations. These rules are:



This behaviour is encouraged in every area of school activity and pupils are helped to recognise examples of good behaviour at all times.

If, however, any child finds these general aims difficult to understand we will help them by making these behaviours clearer, more specific and more suited to their individual needs.

HOW WE ENCOURAGE GOOD SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR Everyone at Aldingbourne Primary School has agreed to: recognise and highlight good behaviour as it occurs ensure that all children are praised for behaving well ensure that criticism is constructive explain and demonstrate the behaviour we wish to see encourage children to be responsible for their own behaviour let parents know about their children's good behaviour reward individual children and groups of children for behaving well We believe that good social behaviour should be recognised and rewarded. Such rewards and privileges may include:

`WHALE' 'BEE' 'NELLIE' awards (infants) Friday 'feel good' phone call to parents British Value badges, Governor awards Merit Book & merit badge house points (juniors) Busy bee postcards, outstanding busy bees We like to recognise the good behaviour of whole classes by: CLASS OF THE WEEK hearing about their good behaviour in assemblies and mentioning in the Merit Book. STOPPING INAPPROPRIATE

BEHAVIOUR

Occasionally, children may forget our aims for good behaviour and be inconsiderate towards others. Everyone at Aldingbourne Primary School has agreed to try to prevent this from happening by:

not drawing attention to misbehaviour as far as possible reminding pupils of the school's aims noticing good behaviour as it occurs

Sometimes this may not be enough and, depending upon the situation, it may be necessary to deal with persistent misbehaviour by:

- $({f \cdots})$ separating the pupil within the class and removing `privileges'
- ©separating the child from the class and referring to the deputy head or Headteacher

contacting parents to discuss ways of helping the child to improve his/her behaviour

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In very rare cases it may be necessary to suspend a pupil, for example if there has been a physical attack on another person. This will only ever be considered after all other possible avenues have been explored. Very careful arrangements will be made to ensure that any child returning to school after suspension is helped to behave appropriately. THE BENEFITS OF GOOD SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR
